Lifetime Learning at Peconic Landing is dedicated to stimulating discourse and friendship among people for whom learning is a lifetime journey. The Lifetime Learning Association at Peconic Landing believes that learning is an important part of self-fulfillment at all ages. In furtherance of that principle, the \$50 annual membership fee for courses supports several projects.

After covering the cost of supplies and equipment needed for LTL's own classes, we annually provide several scholarships for area students. A \$1,000 grant supports Pre-K Education at Greenport Elementary School; two \$1,500 scholarships are awarded to Greenport High School graduating seniors; one \$2,500 scholarship goes to a returning/mature student at the Riverhead campus of Suffolk County Community College.

Our faculty are either members or friends of Peconic Landing. They volunteer their skills, interests and expertise derived from backgrounds in academia, business, or the arts and professions. We are fortunate to have such a group!

The Lifetime Learning Council, which governs our activities, is made up of fifteen members elected for one year renewable terms. Together with over 100 dues-paying members each year, and volunteer faculty, we comprise the "Lifetime Learning Association at Peconic Landing."

Richard's eventual successor, Henry IV, struggled to establish his claim to the throne and control his feckless son and heir, Prince Hal. Our class on *Henry IV* will be 6 weekly sessions. Some history, a bit of acting, some verse, a little music, and much fun. We will view excerpts from professional productions to test

W-9C: EDISON HOME PHONOGRAPH REVISITED

INSTRUCTOR: KEN ETTLINGER

Thomas Edison was first to patent the method for recording speech in 1877. Others, including Alexander Graham Bell made improvements on the design. The first commercial phonograph was the "Edison Home Phonograph" built in West Orange, NJ.



It was carried around like a lunchbox and could record sound on "wax" cylinders as well as play it back. Later, Edison produced "Diamond Disks" to compete with "78's" becoming popular. Ken will divide class time between a discussion of Edison's life in the context of the phonograph, the technology used by the early recording industry and listening to the actual early recordings.

Ken played with an "Edison Home Phonograph" that his dad brought home even making "foil" recordings on it and when he was 10 years old bought an Edison Diamond Disk player. He has collected the recordings that capture a rare glimpse of the America between 1890 and 1930.

Women Secret Agents in Nazi-occupied France in WWll. Working with French resistance to disrupt and destroy vital enemy operations in lead-up to Allied invasion. Course includes slides, film clips, interviews.

Pat has made an extensive study of women's roles in WW II, Vietnam and the Middle East. She lectures and gives presentations on women war correspondents, women airforce service pilots, and nurses in war.
